Lesson 1.1: Witness

SCRIPTURE READING

Matthew 5:14-16

SUMMARY:

You are the light of the world (Matthew 5:14a). This week students look at the famous Sermon on the Mount in the opening chapters of Matthew. Jesus reveals what it looks like to be a disciple of Christ. And it begins with light. It begins with the intention to be seen, to shed light in the darkness, and to point people in the right direction.

God's original mission to Israel was to be a light (Isaiah 42:6, 49:6). And what the disciples had experienced in Jesus had fundamentally changed them, compelling them to live as witnesses of the good news. Their lives became living, breathing evidence of the risen Christ. It is now our mission to carry on. When you become a believer in Christ, your experience of the saving work of Christ is no less powerful and compelling and fundamentally changes who you are. A follower of Christ is called to be a witness and a light in the darkness, to proclaim the good news of God's blessing to the entire world.

Lesson 1.2: Sent

SCRIPTURE READING

John 20:19-23

SUMMARY:

This week students read the story of Jesus appearing to the disciples in a locked room after His resurrection. The disciples were told that they would be sent in the same way Jesus was sent. Jesus' impact while in human flesh was designed only to reach a limited number of people in a particular period. The Church would be sent to take the promise God fulfilled in Jesus and proclaim the good news of salvation through Christ to the ends of the earth.

But being sent implies purpose and intent. To be sent is to be sent on a mission with a specific purpose in mind. Just as the Father sent Jesus, so He now sends the Church. Believers in Christ are a part of a group sent on a Great Commission to make disciples who then go and make more disciples. This is not a suggestion or one of many options for believers in Christ, but a command. This is what it means to be a follower of Jesus—to walk as He did (1 John 2:6).

Lesson 1.3: Accountable

SCRIPTURE READING

Acts 6-7

SUMMARY:

Is it really your responsibility to share the good news of Jesus? What if it is not your gifting? After all, didn't God give us all different gifts? Most people know the story of Stephen in Acts 6 and 7. Stephen wasn't one of the original 12 disciples, he wasn't a pastor or an apostle, or even some kind of gifted evangelist. He was simply a servant of the church and a gifted leader (Acts 6:5-8). Stephen understood the mission and his responsibility to proclaim the gospel when given the opportunity. And he knew that God had provided him everything he needed when the opportunity came. Stephen was just a regular guy with an incredible passion for Jesus and the gospel.

Everyone in the Church is a witness for the gospel in whatever way they've been called to serve. As your student continues to grow in his or her faith and knowledge of Christ, God will continue to provide opportunities to be a witness. Students are being encouraged to look for opportunities, to be faithful with the gifts they have been given, and be willing to step up when the time comes.

Lesson 1.4: Grow

SCRIPTURE READING

Matthew 13:1-9

SUMMARY:

If the gospel is true and Jesus is real and everything in the Bible is accurate, then why don't more people just believe? This week we talked about our role and God's role in the spread of the gospel. It is not exclusively about our gifts and abilities, but rather how God uses them. In 1 Corinthians Paul comments how the success of the church growing was entirely dependent on the favor and grace of God.

As we engage in the mission of God and go into the world as witnesses of the gospel, we are judged not by how many people believe as a result of our efforts or gifts, but by our faithfulness to the work God has called us to. Our efforts and abilities without the Holy Spirit working through us are meaningless. You will talk about Jesus to a lot of people in many contexts. Some will believe, many won't. But our job is to be faithful. It is about God's gospel and God's mission for God's glory.

Lesson 2.1: Paradise

SCRIPTURE READING

Genesis 1

SUMMARY:

Paradise. As God spoke the world into existence, He did so flawlessly—creating an absolute paradise for humanity. And when it came to humanity, He created us to bear His image (Genesis 1:27, 31). So everything perfect and beautiful about God was to be reflected through us. This is actually where it all begins. It begins with what God desires of His creation and most of all, what He desires of us.

And yes, things went all wrong. The stain of sin masked God's beautiful creation. Enter Jesus. God incarnate would be humanity perfectly designed and He would instruct us to be perfect (Matthew 5:48). Be just like the Father—perfect.

But how is this possible when sin has eliminated the possibility of perfection? It is only because of Jesus and through Jesus that such beauty is even possible. This is the gospel. It is the story of God's image in man, tainted and veiled by sin, but revealed in glory through Christ. The command to be perfect is a command to make God's future kingdom a present reality.

Lesson 2.2: Captivity

SCRIPTURE READING

Romans 1:8-32

SUMMARY:

In the story of ancient Israel, the people's insistence to live as they chose and ignore God's design and intention resulted in a weaker nation. As a consequence, Israel found herself in captivity. This week students read from Paul's letter to the Romans. Paul reminds us of what sin has done. Because of sin, humanity has indeed ignored the truth, exchanged righteousness for lies, and worships creation rather than the Creator. But God, in His desire to have an authentic relationship with us, allowed us to go our own way, make our own mistakes, and even make our own gods.

Paul describes how God allows the consequences to do the teaching. It is in captivity—where we see hatred, abuse, anxiety, injustice—that that we truly see the consequences of evil and the need for a savior. And in His great love and mercy for humanity, God did not leave us all out here to suffer. He made a way. Rescue is coming.

- How do you feel or experience the consequences of sin?
- Where do you see the consequences of sin in the world?
- How do you see the love of God responding to the captivity of sin?

Lesson 2.3: Rescue

SCRIPTURE READING

Luke 4:16-30

SUMMARY:

This week's reading, although in the New Testament, takes us back to the Old Testament and the nation of Israel, which had been suffering in captivity for over 400 years. Enter Jesus.

The freedom we desire is found in Jesus. The rescue from sin we have been waiting for is in Jesus. The paradise we lost is found in Jesus. Rescue is not limited to our rescue from the slavery of sin. It is redemption. In other words, it is not just rescue from something, but rescue to something. The good news is the declaration that in Christ we can be brought back to paradise and back to perfection—the way God designed it to be. Our freedom from sin and our perfection are only found through faith in Jesus. God promised to rescue us—a promise the nation of Israel only dreamed about—and He fulfilled His promise in Jesus.

Lesson 2.4: Belong

SCRIPTURE READING

John 17

SUMMARY:

Following Jesus means walking away from the world. In fact, Jesus promises there will be trouble in this life (John 16:33). But Jesus never intended that Christians face life alone. If you take a look throughout the New Testament, you'll see that whenever the gospel is proclaimed, no one is ever alone. John 17 gives us a glimpse of Jesus' final moments in solitude before being arrested, put on trial, and crucified. It is in this moment that He prays for every believer throughout the rest of history.

Every follower of Christ belongs to something so much greater. The people of God are united in the same way that Jesus is united with the Father and the Holy Spirit. It is the kind of unity that cannot be broken. For believers in Christ, every race, gender, social status, economic condition, nation, and culture are united as one tribe under Christ. Together, believers are free from sin and called together to be the community of God's people on mission to proclaim the gospel's saving power through Christ.

Lesson 3.1: Pray

SCRIPTURE READING

Colossians 4:2-6

SUMMARY:

This week students are learning about the role and power of prayer in witnessing to others. Not only is our relationship with Christ dependent on prayer, but our ability to carry out His mission for His people is guided by prayer. This is precisely what Paul is telling the Colossian church in this week's reading. He teaches three specific things about prayer. First, he reminds them to be devoted to prayer (v. 2). Second, Paul points to prayer as a means of reliance on God (v. 3). And third, Paul prays for clarity so others can see Christ through him.

Prayer aligns us with the very heart of God. It helps us see others the way He does. Students are being encouraged to devote themselves to prayer, to be watchful and thankful for what God is doing, and to pray that God would give them the words to be clear as they share truth in love. Pray for your student, that God would open her or his heart to the needs of others and would create deeper and more impactful relationships that reflect Christ.

Lesson 3.2: Share

SCRIPTURE READING

Acts 16:25-31

SUMMARY:

In this week's reading we see Paul demonstrate a kind of awareness Jesus expects of us every day as His followers—and in an unlikely place. Paul and Silas were beaten and thrown into prison. Paul gives us a clear picture of what it means to be ready in every moment. Paul allowed God to use him and that circumstance to change the jailer's life forever. Every moment we encounter another person, whether pleasant or not, could be an opportunity that God has given us to change their life.

Jesus told His disciples to go and make disciples. As students go about their day, hanging with friends at school, playing sports, or just grabbing a quick coffee, we want them to think about how they interact with those around them. Encourage your student to look for the opportunities, pray that the Holy Spirit will provide boldness, and be ready to speak up when it's time. Your student might be the one God uses to change a someone's life for eternity.

Lesson 3.3: Kindness

SCRIPTURE READING

John 4:1-30

SUMMARY:

One of the most hated things about Jesus was the way He treated the people the Pharisees considered terrible sinners and the lowest members of society. The Jewish religious leadership could not tolerate Jesus' humble approach in His interactions with those who were not like Him.

Students are asked to think about their approach when talking about the gospel. What is more important, the point they are trying to make or the person they're talking to? In this week's reading, Jesus gives us the perfect example of how we ought to approach our conversations with others about spiritual matters—being entirely focused on the person and how the message of the gospel connects with their needs. It's not about just trying to close the deal.

For some people, their first impression of Jesus and introduction to the gospel might be your student. Remind him or her that actions used in creating relationships with others will communicate the gospel larger and louder than any words your student speaks.

- How do your interactions with others resemble the Pharisees or Jesus?
- When was the last time you felt regret over how you treated someone?
- When was the last time you were unexpectedly gracious and kind to someone else?

Lesson 3.4: Patience

SCRIPTURE READING

2 Timothy 2:14-26

SUMMARY:

We live in a world of instant gratification. The faster the better. It seems that in every way we have a greater capacity to have more and we have it faster than ever. Can such a mentality work when it comes to being a witness? In Paul's second letter to Timothy, he reminds Timothy to be patient. Be patient with those who will not listen and those who will purposefully cause trouble and controversies—patience for the sake of the gospel. Paul's encouragement to be patient applies to each of us as we continue on this journey of becoming an effective witness of the risen Christ.

Over the course of their lives, students will engage in all kinds of conversations. They may need supernatural amounts of patience as they slowly and carefully lead someone down a path that takes him or her to Christ. Still other conversations may be a one-shot opportunity. However, the same patience is required. This week students are talking and thinking about how preparedness also means using words that are gracious, that we should be others-focused, and that we should have an attitude of patience as we engage in conversation.

- How do you balance sharing the truth with someone and respecting them when they aren't ready to hear you?

Lesson 4.1: Diverse

WITNESSES

SCRIPTURE READING

Acts 10:9-43

SUMMARY:

At its core, God's intention for the Church has always revolved around the gathering of His people, and more importantly the diversity of that gathering. The Church was always designed to be diverse. The nation of Israel once thought Gentiles were not only forbidden from entering the main center of the temple to participate in worship, but they were considered unclean. But Peter's vision in Acts 10 destroys this idea. The Gentiles are now heirs together with Israel, joined together as one Body and now both share in the promise in Christ (Ephesians 3:6).

There is beauty in diversity. To be diverse literally means to be different. But the Church is also a community. It is a unity of everyone together. This is the Church brought together by the gospel and placed under Christ, every nation, tribe, and language beautifully diverse and perfectly united. The gospel was never intended to be restricted to one people, but given to one people with the purpose of taking it to every people.

Lesson 4.2: Reach

WITNESSES

SCRIPTURE READING

Acts 15:1-19

SUMMARY:

While last week students talked about how the promises of God may be for all people, is the gospel message suitable for all cultures and contexts? Or are we, at times, trying to fit a square peg into a round hole? Does the message have to change in order to connect people with Christ? This was precisely the question that Paul and Barnabas had to take on in the early church in the passage students studied this week.

It seems easy—almost natural—for us to either force people into the way we worship or, conversely, change the message because we are trying to be relevant. However, either end of that spectrum is missing the mark. The gospel message transcends time, space, and cultures. Our goal is to become like Peter and Paul—masters of understanding their audience and finding ways to speak truth in a way that does not compromise the message but connects to the hearts of people.

- Talk to me about the most interesting thing you learned from this week's lesson.
- What did you have to change or give up from the normal culture when you decided to follow Jesus?
- What would you expect anyone else to change or give up when they follow Jesus?
- How do you determine if a behavior or practice is just culturally different than you're used to or an issue of sin?
- Tell me your next steps based on what you've learned. How can I help?

Lesson 4.3: Context

SCRIPTURE READING

1 Corinthians 9:19-23

SUMMARY:

Although God's intention for humanity is to be perfectly united in Christ, we maintain a wide variety of contexts and, therefore, an even wider diversity, making it all the more difficult sometimes to find the desire to share the gospel whenever we are presented with the opportunity. Once again Paul provides us with just the right example for how to carry out the mission in all contexts in this week's reading.

It would have been easy for Paul to consider himself somehow superior to others because of his knowledge, his status, and even his encounter with Jesus. Instead, he essentially puts himself in the shoes of the Corinthians. He remains a servant of others and displays a high degree of empathy for those he is ministering to.

This week's challenge is to follow the example of Paul as he follows the example of Christ. The challenge is to be empathetic towards others. Be humble. Seek out new contexts. Get beyond your comfort zone and seek out ways that you can be all things to all people so that through you, God may save some.

Lesson 4.4: Understanding

SCRIPTURE READING

1 Chronicles 12:23-37

SUMMARY:

Consider the nation of Israel: Israel wanted a king. They got Saul. But in order to flourish as the nation God had intended, they would need something better. They would need David. Despite David's strong backing of military might to become the next king, without a degree of wisdom his efforts would have been severely impaired. Enter the people of Issachar. Along with military might, you need intelligence. You need people who understand the situation, the times, the culture, etc. Without wisdom and understanding, enthusiasm and strength can only take you so far.

As people on mission for Christ, we, of course, must have enthusiasm, confidence, and strength. But we must also have wisdom and understanding. We must be students of the world around us. That means we have to get beyond our own comfort zone and learn about people unlike us and embrace these people as children created by an almighty God. It is not enough to simply know the gospel and how to talk about Jesus. We must continually seek to learn more about the people around the world and in our own backyard. We need to be able to step into any context and be ready to share the good news of Jesus Christ.

Lesson 5.1: Dignity

SCRIPTURE READING

Zechariah 7: Matthew 23:1-12, 23-24

SUMMARY:

There is a special condition of the human nature that grants every person who has ever existed value and worth far beyond anything they could ever earn: dignity. Dignity as God sees it is the inherent value and worth we hold because we were created in His image. God cares so deeply about how we treat each other that He sternly warns us in Zechariah 7 and Matthew 23 of His judgment and justice when we violate the God-given dignity of others.

God cares about humanity, all people, enough to create us all in His own image. As bearers of God's image, every person should be treated with dignity and respect, no matter what color, economic status, age, sexual orientation, or religion. Students learned from this week's reading that some of the harshest criticisms in the Bible are directed towards those who ignored the plights of the weak and needy. Being a witness requires that we recognize the dignity of everyone.

Lesson 5.2: Compassion

SCRIPTURE READING

1 John 3

SUMMARY:

What is the difference between compassion and kindness or sympathy? The word compassion originates from the Latin word compati, com- "together" and pati- "suffer," or "to suffer together." Jesus Himself was compassion. He suffered with us. He entered into our suffering and felt our pain. Compassion is an expression of love. It is a supernatural force that moves someone to action. This week's passage is one passage of many in Scripture that describes what it looks like for us to demonstrate God's love through compassion.

John's letters all focus on one thing: love. So often we treat love like it's just a feeling. But in verses 17 and 18 we learn that love compels us to act. Loving God and loving others are not two separate things. We love God by loving others. So whenever we show compassion towards others, we show compassion to Jesus. However, the opposite is also true, that when we deny compassion towards others, we also deny compassion towards Him (vv. 41-45). That's how much Jesus cares about everyone!

- Whom do you have compassion for?
- How do you demonstrate your love for other people?
- How could you become more compassionate?
- Tell me your next steps based on what you've learned. How can I help?

Compassion: To suffer alongside of or with someone

Lesson 5.3: Defend

SCRIPTURE READING

Psalm 82

SUMMARY:

In John 9, Jesus heals a blind man on the Sabbath and the Pharisees didn't like it. Jesus then used this opportunity to explain to them that He was the Messiah. Jesus directly quoted a passage from this week's reading. Psalm 82:6-7 are a harsh statement to those in power (the "gods") who defend the unjust and side with the wicked. The religious leaders in John 9 and 10 should have been experts in the Old Testament Scriptures and thus known exactly what they taught, including Jesus' reference to Psalm 82.

The ultimate goal of a witness is obviously to share the gospel. However, this is not all that God requires of us. We also need to defend the weak and powerless. Students may ask themselves, "Who am I?" They may not have any position of authority. But they can defend someone being bullied in school. They can volunteer their time, money, influence, or privilege in status to speak up for the dignity and rights of others. When they defend the weak and powerless, they are being true witnesses for Christ.

Lesson 5.4: Refuge

SCRIPTURE READING

Psalm 36

SUMMARY:

Many colleges nowadays are creating safe spaces on campus, locations where students are sheltered from abuse and offensive ideas. But did you know that the church was the original safe space? Hence, a sanctuary. This should not surprise us, as throughout the Bible God is constantly called our refuge. Many of the Psalms were written by David, who relied heavily on God as his refuge. His life was in danger many times and he constantly cried out to God to save him from his enemies. And God was always faithful.

Students may also be facing hardships and persecution for being a witness for Christ. In America, students may be mocked and called names. In other countries, a witness could be imprisoned or even put to death. This week we focus on the refuge and strength found only in Christ.

Lesson 6.1: Unique

SCRIPTURE READING

Genesis 1

SUMMARY:

In Genesis 1 we see the creativity of God on full display in His creation. The creation of humanity on day six is the climax of creation. God's desire for humanity was that we would be set apart from everything else and that we would bear His divine image. Although imperfect, finite, and now tainted, each person has in them attributes of God—things like a sense of justice, personality, wisdom, love, and the ability to create.

Although our thoughts and actions may not be completely unique in every conceivable way, as divine image bearers we are, in fact, incredibly unique. Each one of us is an original thought of God designed to reflect the originality of God. The uniqueness of each student is exactly how God intended for the gospel to make it to the ends of the earth.

SCRIPTURE READING

Genesis 2

SUMMARY:

God wanted His image to be reflected in not only all that He created, but in all that we create as well. As image bearers of the divine Creator, we have been created to create. God gave Adam what is called the Creation Mandate. For Adam this meant working the ground. We each have been given a craft to cultivate specifically to glorify the Creator. This is precisely what God was talking about in Genesis 1:26 and 2:15.

Witnesses for the gospel do far more than just talk about Jesus. Witnesses use the gifts, abilities, talents, and desires—their entire lives—in order to create something that points back to and reflects the glory of God. Each of us has been specifically built as a co-creator charged with the divine responsibility to proclaim the name of Jesus and the power of the gospel.

SCRIPTURE READING

Matthew 25:14-30

SUMMARY:

You have been created in the divine image. In that likeness, you also have been given the ability to reflect that image with what you create. But this image we possess is not a privilege, it is a responsibility. The Creation Mandate given to Adam was more than just a task to complete, but a dedication to God of everything Adam was given as an act of worship. The mandate applies to us in the same way.

Because we are uniquely designed specifically by God and for God, we have the responsibility to recognize and refine our gifts, talents, and abilities, working to become more like Christ with every step and reflecting Him in more significant ways. There is great power in what God has given us because those gifts and talents are the means by which God can use us to change the trajectory of someone else's life and bring them back to Him. Our gifts and talents are the mechanisms or wiring for how each of us can best communicate the gospel and be a witness for Christ.

SCRIPTURE READING

Colossians 3:1-11, 1 Timothy 4:6-16

SUMMARY:

Every musician, artist, athlete, business professional, or teacher knows practice is the only path to an improved, polished presentation. It is as though God did not finish the job when He created each student—He was just getting started. His goal is that each of us—His canvases—look increasingly more and more like Christ. Declaring faith in Christ does not end with verbal confession of Christ as Lord. It is only the beginning. In Colossians 3, Paul is reminding the Colossians that they are an unfinished canvas, daily being made more and more to look and act like Christ.

But just like any great work of art, it is meant to be displayed and admired, not hidden away. The gospel has incredible transformative power because of the power of the Spirit at work. But the only way people can take notice and admire Him is by us showing off our new selves—by clothing ourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience (Colossians 3:12, NIV). We must be people of forgiveness, love, and unity. We must be people that show off God's amazing works of art.

SCRIPTURE READING

Luke 22:54-61

SUMMARY:

Fear is an extremely powerful emotion that can overcome and paralyze us. And fear can hinder us from being witnesses. Peter was one of Jesus' disciples and closest friends, but came face-to-face not only with his fear, but with the power fear had over him. Naturally, Peter would have been afraid of the horror of crucifixion. When we read about Peter in the book of Acts, he is out fearlessly proclaiming the gospel.

What happened? What caused such a drastic change in Peter? The resurrection. When Jesus rose from the dead, He conquered death once and for all. The Bible guarantees that we will suffer for the sake of the gospel. Jesus suffered. The disciples suffered. Christians throughout the world continue to suffer for the sake of the gospel. But we should not fear. Jesus defeated sin and death when He rose from the dead. Death is not final.

Lesson 7.2: Persecution

SCRIPTURE READING

Matthew 5:1-12

SUMMARY:

This week's reading is from Jesus' famous Sermon on the Mount, most specifically what is known as the Beatitudes (named for the Latin word beatus, which means "blessed"). Verses 10 through 12 end the Beatitudes by discussing the theme for this lesson: persecution. These verses tell us that those who are persecuted or insulted and mistreated because of their faith will be blessed. Not only that, it calls us to rejoice and be glad in suffering because our reward is in heaven and others have faced the same horrible treatment before us.

The Beatitudes are more than a list of good things Christians should do. They are an assurance that if we suffer for being Christians, it will be worth it. Those who realize their brokenness and need of God's help will receive it (v. 3). Those who do not fight to get ahead, who do not aggressively seek advancement and position, will ultimately receive the entire earth as their reward (v. 5). Jesus promised that although we may face hardships in this life, we will be blessed by God through the peace only He can provide. And ultimately, in the next life, we will reign with Him forever.

SCRIPTURE READING

Luke 9:57-62

SUMMARY:

To be honest, Jesus seems completely unreasonable in this week's reading from Luke 9. Three men seek to follow Jesus, but He seems to shut them all down. There is a cost to being a witness for Christ. As we saw in our last lesson, we may even be persecuted for our faith and make the ultimate sacrifice for Christ. But this was a sacrifice that God Himself was willing to make.

Christ's sacrifice was more than we could ever imagine, bearing the sins of the world. For that, we owe Him everything. Jesus is trying to help those who desire to follow Him to know the costs. For students, it may not be leaving their family or giving up the comforts of their home, but committed followers are always asked to be willing to sacrifice in some way for the sake of the kingdom.

Lesson 7.4: Love

SCRIPTURE READING

Luke 6:27-36

SUMMARY:

John is called the apostle of love because he wrote of love so much in his Gospel and letters. He penned the famous John 3:16, which tells us that God sent us His Son to save us because of His great love for us. In this week's reading from Luke 6, we are instructed to love more than just our friends, family, and fellow Christians, the ones who love us back. Jesus commanded us to love everyone just because every person is valuable and made in the image of God.

God demonstrated this kind of love first. While we were still in our sin, we were enemies with God (see Romans 5). But God died for us because He loved us so much. This is how we are the greatest witnesses, not by loving people who are lovable, but by loving people the world sees as unlovable, giving to those who cannot give back, taking insults, and not fighting back. This is what it means to be true witnesses. This is what will show the world that Jesus lives within us.

CORE CONCEPTS

We cannot properly communicate the gospel without first loving others.

Mercy: An act of compassion toward an offender or enemy
