OUT - PURSUE MISSION

He recounts the story of Dr. Howard Hendricks and the great impact his childhood teacher had on the trajectory of his life. What can we learn from this story and model in our own life and choices?
- 6. How has praying for others changed your view of them and/or moved you to action?

For Personal Reflection/Prayer:

What would you say is your greatest ambition in life? What are you doing with the gifts, talents, time, and resources God has given to you? Are you holding anything back because of fear of failure or feelings of inadequacy or obscurity? Pray that the Lord would show you ways to respond to His call in your life.

Embracing Discipleship – Part 2: The Person God Calls and Uses June 6 / 7, 2020 Pastor Henry

Many people feel obscure or insignificant with limited abilities. They feel that what they do doesn't really matter. Sadly, this feeling often prevents them from stepping out into God's faith adventures.

The disciples Jesus chose began as obscure men without extraordinary talents (Matthew 8-9). But Jesus chose them, not on the basis of who *they were*, but who *they would become*. As they responded to the cost (Matt 8:18-22) and the requirements (Matt 9:35-38) of following Him, He was preparing them to become the foundation of the Church that would turn their world upside down.

As we look at the life of one of Jesus' disciples, Andrew, we will learn about the person God uses. Andrew's example will encourage you to believe how God can use you.

Andrew put others before himself. He was always second to his brother Peter: in their fishing business and in the prominence Scriptures give to Peter. If you've lived in the shadow of a brother, sister, spouse, or workmate, you may feel envious, inadequate and inferior--and this might have deepened your conviction that God can't use you the way He uses others.

Andrew became a Christ follower before Peter, but he didn't try to upstage his brother. Instead, he searched for and found Peter and introduced him to Jesus. God calls you to surrender yourself and your reputation completely to Jesus (Mark 8:35). As you do, you will find your identity in Him and your focus will become Jesus and not yourself.

Andrew was clear on his mission. Outside of listing Andrew as one of the disciples, the Gospels mention him three times (John 1:40-42, John 6:8-9, John 12:20-22). Each time he introduced someone to Jesus. Andrew's mission was clear: to sincerely befriend people, show them the love of Jesus by serving them, and introduce them to Jesus. What about you? Are you clear on your life's mission?

Andrew loved people. In the story of Jesus feeding the five thousand (John 6:8-9), people had been listening to Jesus all afternoon. It was getting late, and they were tired and hungry. His disciples didn't know how to feed them. But Andrew brought a little boy who offered his lunch. If your mission is to love people and bring them to Jesus, you will reach out to others, regardless of their age, race, gender or social status.

A good example of how God uses ordinary people comes through the life story of Dr. Hendricks, author and professor at Dallas Theological Seminary. When he was a boy, his parents divorced and he assumed it was his fault. He became an angry trouble-maker. Most of his teachers predicted he would end up in prison. The turning point came when his new teacher told him, "Howard, I've heard a lot about you, but I don't believe a word of it." As she invested her life in him, he began to follow Jesus. Over time, God used him to support and impact thousands of Christian leaders.

What if this teacher believed she had little or nothing to offer Howard? But as she loved him, God changed the trajectory of his life.

As we look at Andrew and Hendrick's teacher, may we believe that God can use us even with our fears of failure or feelings of inadequacy. As the Lord speaks to you about loving and reaching others for Jesus, say "Yes", and commit yourself to doing what He prompts you to do.
